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Eurasian Journal of Pulmonology (Eurasian J Pulmonol) is an international, scientific, open access online-only periodical published in accordance with independent, unbiased, and double-blinded peer-review principles. The journal is the official publication of Turkish Respiratory Society and it is published tri-annually on April, August, and December.

Eurasian Journal of Pulmonology publishes clinical and experimental studies on respiratory diseases, reviews on current topics, case reports, editorial comments and letters to the editor that are prepared in accordance with the ethical guidelines. The journal may also publish guidelines and reports on the subjects within the scope of the journal. Conferences and abstracts presented in the annual national congress of the Turkish Respiratory Society are published in a special issue.

The target population of the journal includes specialists and academicians operating in the fields of pulmonary diseases, thoracic surgery, and physiology.

The editorial and publication processes of the journal are shaped in accordance with the guidelines of the International Committee of Medical Journal Editors (ICMJE), World Association of Medical Editors (WAME), Council of Science Editors (CSE), Committee on Publication Ethics (COPE), European Association of Science Editors (EASE), and National Information Standards Organization (NISO). The journal is in conformity with the Principles of Transparency and Best Practice in Scholarly Publishing (doaj.org/bestpractice).

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All expenses of the journal are covered by the Turkish Respiratory Society.

Statements or opinions expressed in the manuscripts published in the journal reflect the views of the author(s) and not the opinions of the Turkish Respiratory Society, editors, editorial board, and/or publisher; the editors, editorial board, and publisher disclaim any responsibility or liability for such materials.

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Editorial Comments: Editorial comments aim to provide a brief critical commentary by reviewers with expertise or with high reputation in the topic of the research article published in the journal. Authors are selected and invited by the journal to provide such comments. Abstract, Keywords, and Tables, Figures, Images, and other media are not included.

Review Articles: Upon invitation from the journal, reviews are prepared by authors who have extensive knowledge on a particular field and whose scientific background has been translated into a high volume of publications with a high citation potential. The review should be prepared to explain, discuss, and evaluate the latest position attained in a particular topic for use in the clinical practice and should guide future studies. Please check Table 1 for the limitations for Review Articles.

Case Reports: There is limited space for case reports in the journal and reports on rare cases or conditions that constitute challenges in diagnosis and treatment, those offering new therapies or revealing knowledge not included in the literature, and interesting and educative case reports are accepted for publication. The text should include Introduction, Case Presentation, Discussion, and Conclusion subheadings. Please check Table 1 for the limitations for Case Reports.

Letters to the Editor: This type of manuscript discusses important parts, overlooked aspects, or lacking parts of a previously published article. Articles on subjects within the scope of the journal that might attract the readers' attention, particularly educative cases, may also be submitted in the form of a "Letter to the Editor." Readers can also present their comments on the published manuscripts in the form of a "Letter to the Editor." Abstract, Keywords, and Tables, Figures, Images, and other media should not be included. The text should be unstructured. The manuscript that is being commented on must be properly cited within this manuscript. Please check Table 1 for the limitations for Letters to the Editor.

Clinical Images and Quizzes: This type of submissions should present a striking image that may challenge and inform readers and contribute to their education. Please check Table 1 for the limitations for Clinical Images and Quizzes.

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Tables

Tables should be included in the main document, presented after the reference list, and they should be numbered consecutively in the order they are referred to within the main text. A descriptive title must be placed above the tables. Abbreviations used in the tables should be defined below the tables by footnotes (even if they are defined within the main text). Tables should be created using the “insert table” command of the word processing software and they should be arranged clearly to provide easy reading. Data presented in the tables should not be a repetition of the data presented within the main text but should be supporting the main text.

Figures and Figure Legends

Figures, graphics, and photographs should be submitted as separate files (in TIFF or JPEG format) through the submission system. The files should not be embedded in a Word document or the main document. When there are figure subunits, the subunits should not be merged to form a single image. Each subunit should be submitted separately through the submission system. Images should not be labelled (a, b, c, etc.) to indicate figure subunits. Thick and thin arrows, arrowheads, stars, asterisks, and similar marks can be used on the images to support figure legends. Like the rest of the submission, the figures too should be blind. Any information within the images that may indicate an individual or institution should be blinded. The minimum resolution of each submitted figure should be 300 DPI. To prevent delays in the evaluation process, all submitted figures should be clear in resolution and large in size (minimum dimensions: 100 × 100 mm). Figure legends should be listed at the end of the main document.

All acronyms and abbreviations used in the manuscript should be defined at first use, both in the abstract and in the main text. The abbreviation should be provided in parentheses following the definition.

When a drug, product, hardware, or software program is mentioned within the main text, product information, including the name of the product, the producer of the product, and city and the country of the company (including the state if in USA), should be provided in parentheses in the following format: “Discovery St PET/CT scanner (General Electric, Milwaukee, WI, USA)”

All references, tables, and figures should be referred to within the main text, and they should be numbered consecutively in the order they are referred to within the main text.

Limitations, drawbacks, and the shortcomings of original articles should be mentioned in the Discussion section before the conclusion paragraph.

References

While citing publications, preference should be given to the latest, most up-to-date publications. If an ahead-of-print publication is cited, the DOI number should be provided. Authors are responsible for the accuracy of references. Journal titles should be abbreviated in accordance with the journal abbreviations in Index Medicus/ MEDLINE/PubMed. When there are six or fewer authors, all authors should be listed. If there are seven or more authors, the first six authors should be listed followed by “et al.” In the main text of the manuscript, references should be cited using Arabic numbers in parentheses. The reference styles for different types of publications are presented in the following examples.

REVISIONS

When submitting a revised version of a paper, the author must submit a detailed “Response to the reviewers” that states point by point how each issue raised by the reviewers has been covered and where it can be found (each reviewer’s comment, followed by the author’s reply and line numbers where the changes have been made) as well as an annotated copy of the main document. Revised manuscripts must be submitted within 30 days from the date of the decision letter. If the revised version of the manuscript is not submitted within the allocated time, the revision option may be canceled. If the submitting author(s) believe that additional time is required, they should request this extension before the initial 30-day period is over.

Accepted manuscripts are copy-edited for grammar, punctuation, and format. Once the publication process of a manuscript is completed, it is published online on the journal’s webpage as an ahead-of-print publication before it is included in its scheduled issue. A PDF proof of the accepted manuscript is sent to the corresponding author and their publication approval is requested within 2 days of their receipt of the proof.

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Editorial

We present to you a new issue of the Eurasian Journal of Pulmonology, which includes interesting studies. Although minimal, we hope to relieve the world from fight, violence, starvation, and premature deaths with the help of content-based articles. These articles will probably not remediate the above-mentioned problems, but they can contribute to the occurrence of enlightened minds, which will give rise to a world without wars.

In this issue, we begin with two actual reviews. One is regarding high-flow oxygen therapy, which is gradually becoming more common in clinical practice, and the other is on ex vivo lung perfusion, which is used almost routinely for lung transplantation and expected to contribute to resolve donor issues.

In addition, some aspects of chronic obstructive pulmonary disease that need to be emphasized are discussed in two original research articles.

We hope that you will read the article by Tural Önür et al. regarding the effects of omalizumab therapy on various markers in asthmatic patients with great interest.

Moreover, this issue includes two successful articles on smoking. These multi-centered, well-designed studies investigated the importance of partner support and factors that are effective in unassisted smoking cessation. We hope that both articles will be referred to frequently and will be insightful.

This issue ends with two studies from Spain. The first article summarizes an interesting and rare case of respiratory distress. The other briefly reports the surgical management of subcutaneous emphysema.

We will soon have the Respiratory Congress (Turkish Respiratory Research Society, 39th National Congress, October 14–18, 2017; İzmir-<http://solunum.org.tr/solunum2017>) which will have a busy scientific schedule. We would like to state that we are prepared to assess your studies, enigmatic cases, and rare radiological or clinical images, which will be presented in this congress, for publication. This journal aims to introduce your valuable studies and the results of your scientific work to the entire world.
